Here I Am, Lord

The popular hymn Here I Am, Lord by Dan Schutte brought the "yes" of Samuel (this Sunday's first reading) and the "yes" of the first disciples (this Sunday's Gospel) to the voice of all of us who have sung the familiar piece. So, how difficult is it to say, "Here I am, Lord; I come to do your will?" On the one hand if Jesus is asking you to do something, it's probably a good idea to do it. On the other hand, our free will, and often-fierce desire to control our own destiny, has us holding back from cooperating with God's plan. We write our dreams of what a future featuring "me" should be. We paint the scene of the perfect life. We work within the paradigms of a culture that tells us what to hold dear. But saying "yes" to God means living a life of surprises that unfold in a timeframe that is nothing like the calendars that seem to run our lives right now. Saying "Here I Am, Lord" makes us wonderfully vulnerable to the life-giving desires of a God who loves us unconditionally and wants only the best for us. All we have to do is "come and see" what life is like when we surrender to the One who pursues us relentlessly while we go looking for perfection somewhere else. All we have to do is stop planning and start praying: "I will go Lord, if you lead me."

(symbolizing Jesus, the Christ Child) is baked inside the King Cake. The shape of a hollow circle is to portray the circular route taken by the Magi to confuse King Herod. The cake is topped with sprinkled colored sugar: Purple - representing Christ's suffering; Green - symbolizing renewal and faith; Gold - as a reminder of God's presence among us.






THE ANNUAL MIDNIGHT RUN IS COMING UP!

What People Are Saying!

For those of you who may not know much about St. Aloysius School, please allow me to tell you a little about it. Academics aside (and the academics I assure you are firmly rooted in NC standards, with the majority of each class scores in the 96th percentile or above on standardized testing), here's a list that I put together of what I think the children learn:

The children learn about God: They pray in the morning, say the Angelus at noon, and at the end of the day, they say an Act of Contrition to ask God for forgiveness for their sins.

The children learn forgiveness: If you have a child in a kindergarten class, don't be surprised if you hear the words, "that's ok, I forgive you." I was surprised (shocked) the first time I heard my son say it, but now I find myself saying it with frequency.

The children learn success: I think everyone's heard the Bible referred to as the ultimate success manual. At St. Aloysius, the Bible is used to teach morality, and to teach children to openly live their faith.

They learn about Patriotism: At St. Aloysius, love of God and love of country are openly discussed. The flag is raised each morning and lowered prior to dismissal by the students themselves, instructed in the proper respect, handling & folding of our nation's proud symbol.

They Learn about Christmas: While Santa Claus, reindeer, & Jingle Bells are fun symbols of Christmas, at St. Aloysius, Christmas means that Jesus is born. The 3 Kings make their journey, and the world is given hope.
